Key inquiry questions

- What effect does environmental quality and access to services have on people's wellbeing?
- What effect does the uneven distribution of water resources have on people, places and environments?

Syllabus outcomes

Syllabus content

Geographical concepts, skills and tools

Interconnection: no object of geographical study can be viewed in isolation eg how people are affected by the environment with regard to landscapes, climate, natural hazards and the liveability of places; how people affect the environment such as people's use of water on its quality and availability as a resource.

<u>Processing geographical information</u> - apply geographical concepts to draw conclusions based on the analysis of the data and information collected

<u>Communicating geographical information</u> - present findings, arguments and ideas in a range of communication forms selected to suit a particular audience and purpose; using geographical terminology and digital technologies as appropriate

Sydney Water aim for activity

One of our objectives is to protect public health. We do this by producing safe clean drinking water and taking wastewater away for treatment. Sydney Water supports Orange Sky who aim to provide access to water for basic hygiene and restore dignity to those who are easily forgotten.

Teaching and learning

Introduction

- **Q**. Ask students what services do they consider **essential to livability**.
- A. Health, education, electricity, clean safe drinking water.
- Q. Let's consider water... how do we use water every day?
- **A.** Toilet, shower, cooking, washing, laundry, gardens, cleaning. See our water use webpage.
- Q. Access to water is an important for liveability and human wellbeing. How do you value water?
- **A**. Water adds to our quality of life, our health and wellbeing and our connection to place. See the livable cities page for discussion points and the value of water.
- **Q.** What if you didn't have access to clean safe drinking water for these uses?
- **A.** Poor health outcomes. Poor amenity. Most of us take access to water for granted, it's always there and we can use it whenever we want. Some people don't have access to water, especially if they don't have a home of their own.
